





## NATIONAL APPRENTICESHIP WEEK 2024

National Apprenticeship Week 2024 takes place from the 5th – 11th February. This year's theme is **Skills for Life**.

In school, every student will have had the opportunity this week to learn about apprenticeships during form time.

Exploring how the subjects they enjoy could lead to future apprenticeship opportunities is useful for all students, whether they are:

- Just starting to think about the world of work in years 7 and 8;
- Choosing their GCSE options in year 9;
- Exploring post-16 options in years 10 and 11; or
- Deciding between work or university in year 13.

## WHAT IS AN APPRENTICESHIP? - 8 KEY FACTS

- 1. An apprenticeship is a real job available to individuals aged 16+ (with no upper age limit). Apprentices are typically employed for at least 30 hours per week.
- 2. All apprentices will earn a salary of at least the National Minimum Wage for apprentices, which is currently £5.20\* per hour. Many employers pay more.

## WHAT IS AN APPRENTICESHIP? CONTINUED...

3. Apprenticeships last a minimum of 12 months. Most apprenticeships take between 1 - 4 years to complete. It will depend on the level of the apprenticeship and how it is delivered.

### 4. Apprenticeship Levels:

Apprenticeships range from Level Two (equivalent to GCSEs), right up to Level Seven (Master's level). It is even possible to achieve a degree through an apprenticeship. Read more about levels <a href="https://example.com/here">here</a>

- 5. Apprentices do not pay for their training. All apprenticeship costs are paid for by the employer and/or the government, meaning that an apprentice will never have to pay for their training.
- 6. Apprentices receive paid, off-thejob learning The equivalent of 6 hours per week is spent undertaking paid, off-the-job learning, gaining valuable skills and qualifications.








## HOW DO APPRENTICESHIPS LINK TO SCHOOL SUBJECTS?

- 7. Apprentices spend the majority of their time on-the-job. Most of an apprentice's paid time will be spent on-the-job, working with colleagues to learn new skills and gain experience of the workplace.
- 8. There are thousands of apprenticeships in more than 170 industries. New apprenticeships are advertised each week, covering a wide range of job roles. You might be surprised at the variety and breadth of roles available.




### APPRENTICESHIP MYTHS BUSTED

## SPOTLIGHT ON CARE EXPERIENCED APPRENTICES

Care experienced young people can access additional support from their employer and training provider if needed. This support can help apprentices to make adjustments to enable them to carry out their role effectively and complete their apprenticeship.

If eligible, young apprentices can also be supported to claim the **Care Leaver's Bursary** of £3,000).




## WHERE CAN YOUNG PEOPLE LOOK FOR APPRENTICESHIPS?

- Search on the <u>National</u>
   <u>Apprenticeship Service</u> website.
- Contact employers directly many large organisations, small businesses, start-up companies, local councils and health authorities are on the lookout for the right apprentice. People who are proactive enough to get in touch can really stand out.
- A significant number of recruiters now hire via social media channels and this means that a lot of positions never get advertised on job boards or other websites.
   Searching on Tik Tok, Instagram,
   Facebook, Linked in and X can be a great way of finding opportunities.
- Search online jobs boards like Indeed, Monster, Totaljobs, Reed, GetMyFirstJob and Apprentice Employment Agency
- Attend an Apprenticeship
   Recruitment Fair the next local one is in Leeds on Monday 5th February 1-7pm
- **Use your network** tell everyone you know you are looking for an apprenticeship! You never know what or who they might know.

The application process for every apprenticeship vacancy is different. It may simply involve a CV and cover letter, or there may be several elements and stages involved.












## RESOURCES FOR YEAR 13 STUDENTS
